

HADR and SAR: Overcoming Sovereignty Concerns Henrick Z. Tsjeng Associate Research Fellow, Maritime Security Programme

The Indo-Pacific Region is highly vulnerable to natural disasters. Recent catastrophes demonstrated the urgent necessity for international cooperation in humanitarian assistance and disaster relief (HADR) and search-and-rescue (SAR) in the region.

However, HADR and SAR cooperation in the region is not without its challenges, including an absence of coordination and communication between parties, and the lack of effective institutional mechanisms and infrastructure to deal with a crisis. Most of all, sensitivities surrounding sovereignty considerations compounded by broader geopolitical factors could hamper international cooperation. The main casualty from such tensions is trust — the lack of which inevitably hampers the efficacy of multilateral operation.

Sovereignty concerns emerged in two recent major disasters. In the 2004 Indian Ocean Tsunami, Indonesia was criticised by the international community for impeding aid distribution in the stricken areas. The same criticism was levelled against the Myanmar government for its failure to act adequately during the Cyclone Nargis disaster. It should be noted that Myanmar was in fact more receptive towards India's offer of aid, given the relatively warm relations (and high level of trust) between the two countries, and ASEAN was heavily involved in reconstruction efforts despite international condemnation of the country.

The disasters laid bare the clashing priorities of sovereignty maintenance against openness towards international aid. Sovereignty concerns are unavoidable in some cases during an HADR or SAR operation. As such, countries involved should instead seek alternatives to promote confidence and trust, which could in turn encourage regional states to be more receptive towards international relief.

ASEAN has a certain level of experience in developing a multilateral framework for HADR and SAR cooperation, ranging from the ASEAN Regional Forum and Exercises under the auspices of the ASEAN Defence Ministers Meeting Plus, to the establishment of the ASEAN Coordinating Centre for Humanitarian Assistance on Disaster Management (AHA Centre). However, both the Typhoon Haiyan and MH370 disasters revealed potential gaps in putting the discussions and lessons learnt into

practice, as well as the effective usage of mechanisms like the AHA Centre. At the heart of these drawbacks were concerns over trust. This was shown when it was reported that countries involved in the search for MH370 did not release a suitable amount of information on the plane's flight path in a timely manner, hinting at a lack of confidence and trust between these countries.


Nevertheless, there were positive indicators. For instance, Japan agreed to send naval assets to join the search for the plane - in which a majority of passengers were Chinese nationals - with China thanking Japan for the move. Furthermore, Singapore's Information Fusion Centre (IFC) was also tapped to contribute to the search, which was inevitably a multilateral endeavour given the presence of International Liaison Officers in the Centre. While these are small steps towards building at least a measure of confidence, they nonetheless demonstrate that multilateral cooperation is possible despite political challenges.

Ultimately, this is about shifting local government attitudes towards multilateral efforts during a disaster, in a way that is also sensitive towards sovereignty considerations. Towards that end, confidence-building measures as well as engagement through dialogue and exercises should take place even before an incident occurs and continue throughout the course of the incident. These should be long-term efforts rather than ad hoc attempts. Only then can trust be established, which could make a stricken government more receptive to international assistance. As such, exercises or cooperative operations should be organised with trust-building as the main goal.

Other conditions are also essential, such as the existence of a coordinating centre, transparency and maintenance of personnel-to-personnel relationships. Non-government organisations should also play a role as a neutral and impartial facilitator in HADR operations. Finally, militaries involved should leave as little a footprint as possible during the operation, so as to offset any suspicions of foreign military involvement or concerns regarding sovereignty and national control.

The Coast Guard has arrested 55 foreign crew members and three Singaporean financiers involved in these cases, the Singapore Police Force said on Monday (Sep 15). The most recent case in May revolved around a foreign-registered tugboat, which was involved in the illegal sale of 10,000 litres of MGO at the sea off Penjuru.

IMO panel drafts safety code for LNG fueled ships

SEPTEMBER 19, 2014 — An IMO panel has agreed a draft International Code of Safety for Ships using Gases or other Low flashpoint Fuels (IGF Code). The code, which would become manadatory under proposed amendments to SOLAS, sets out mandatory provisions for the arrangement, installation, control and monitoring of machinery, equipment and systems using low flashpoint fuels, such as liquefied natural gas (LNG).
