

Why Naval Accidents Occur

As shown most tragically by the sinking of the Korean ferry Sewol in April 2014 with the loss of over 300 lives, human error is a major cause of shipping accidents. Navies are not immune from this problem. A warship is a demanding technological environment requiring a high level of crew competence and experience and mistakes can occur, often with disastrous consequences, through factors such as lack of proper training, inexperience and complacency.

Two of the world's largest navies, the Indian Navy (IN) and the United States Navy (USN) have both experienced a worrying number of accidents in recent years in which human error has been the major cause. The Chief of the IN resigned in February 2014, taking moral responsibility for ten accidents involving Indian warships in the previous seven months. The accidents ranged from serious ones onboard submarines, possibly as a result of complacency and poor training, through to collisions and groundings. IN surface ship accidents included a frigate ramming a fishing vessel and several groundings. Most recently in November 2014, an IN corvette was damaged after colliding with a container ship in the Bay of Bengal.

The USN has been plagued by collisions and groundings in recent years. Fiscal year 2011 was reported to be the worst year for submarine accidents with three serious ones that could have led to the loss of the submarine. With surface ships, human error caused the grounding and loss of the minesweeper USS Guardian on a reef in the Philippines in January 2013. A Panamanian shipping company is currently suing the U.S. government to pay for repairs to one of its tankers after a USN destroyer collided with it in the Middle East. In July 2014, a USN landing Ship Dock (LSD) and an oil tanker were extensively damaged after colliding during replenishment operations off Hawaii. In December 2014, the USS Tortuga (LSD 46) ran over the top of a navigational buoy off the Virginian coast with the buoy breaking adrift and the ship damaged.

Fortunately the Republic of Singapore Navy has not experienced any recent major accidents but human error caused its worst accident. In 2003, the patrol vessel RSS Courageous was cut in two with the loss of four lives after a collision with a merchant vessel off Pedra Branca. The subsequent investigation found that the collision was caused by errors of judgment by

the Courageous involving loss of situational awareness and breaches of the International Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea (COLREGS).



The risks of these problems have been increased by greater reliance of bridge personnel on computerised systems rather than a visual lookout. A modern ship's bridge is awash with electronic screens but a proper visual outlook remains essential. It is extremely difficult to maintain situational awareness on an electronic screen — the "Mark One eyeball" is the only truly effective means.

There is no shortage of personnel on the bridge of a warship. In fact the number of personnel can be a problem in itself. A Torres Strait pilot reported after piloting a USN guided-missile cruiser through the Strait that while there were a lot of people doing a lot of things vigorously on the bridge, 'the navigation team was consumed by the data that technology provided with very little consideration given to the importance of looking out for visual references'. The grounding of a similar vessel on a reef off Honolulu in 2009 was attributed to human error and a dysfunctional bridge Bridge team. resource management is a critical requirement if accidents are to be avoided.

The risks of naval accidents will increase as regional navies expand and shipping traffic increases. The risks are further increased when warships engage in close quarters' situations, but the effectiveness of arrangements to avoid incidents at sea, such as the Code for Unplanned Encounters between Ships (CUES) depends entirely on good seamanship and situational awareness on the ships involved. It's all very well preaching adherence to COLREGS, but accidents will still occur if bridge crews are dysfunctional and lack situational awareness.

Reuters reported in September that Australia was leaning towards buying as many as 12 off-the-shelf stealth submarines from Japan despite domestic pressure to build them at home.

U.S. Navy laser weapon performing beyond expectations: official

Rear Admiral Matthew Klunder, head of the Office of Naval Research, said the \$40 million laser weapon was fully integrated into systems aboard the USS Ponce at the end of the summer for a year of testing.

LCA-Navy is the second Ski Take Off But Arrested Recovery (STOBAR) carrier-borne aircraft in the world, after a Russian deck based aircraft.

China building base near isles disputed with Japan, Kyodo says

China's military is building a large military base on islands about 300 kilometers (190 miles) from an islet chain at the center of a territorial row with Japan, Kyodo News reported today, citing unidentified Chinese sources. The base on the Nanji islands in Zhejiang Province is designed to enhance China's readiness to respond to a potential military crisis and strengthen surveillance over an air defense identification zone it declared in the area in November last year, the news agency said.

Taiwan launches its first indigenous stealth corvette

Taiwan on Tuesday (Dec 23) launched its first indigenous stealth missile corvette, described by officials as Asia's fastest and most powerful warship. The Tuo River-class corvette costs US\$70 million, measures 60.4 metres long and 14 metres wide and carries 41 crew members.

Srikandi 515 with IMO number 9710828 was laden with 3,100 tons of palm oil en route to Gresik, East Java from Sampit, Indonesia before being boarded by armed robbers while underway in the Java Sea approximately 57nm south of Sampit.

Rare good oil for Australian iron ore miners on shipping costs

A slump in the price of oil to \$US64 a barrel for Brent crude has delivered much-needed relief to iron ore miners, who are receiving a significant discount on the cost of shipping to Asia. The cost of "bunker fuel" for the cape-sized vessels that typically carry iron ore has fallen 39 per cent since January, with most of that fall from the start of October. After spending much of the past four years between \$US600 (\$723) and \$US700 per tonne, prices for bunker fuel were fetching just \$US387 per tonne this week.
