

### MSP PERSPECTIVES



Naval Expansion in Southeast Asia: The Malaysia Case Geoffrey Till, Visiting Professor, Maritime Security Programme

There is a widespread tendency for observers to get over-concerned at the processes of naval modernisation that are going on throughout Southeast Asia, and to imagine that they are driven by the same kind of impulses as in other rather more worrying parts of the Asia-Pacific region. People wonder whether bigger and more effective navies in the area will destabilise it - and fret about the prospects of a naval arms race. While, of course, this possibility cannot entirely be ruled out and needs to be guarded against because of the damage it could do, this preoccupation hides two other aspects of naval modernisation which are consequently neglected. The first is that naval modernisation is generally part and parcel of a wider drive towards a greater appreciation of the importance of the sea and of modernising the whole of the maritime sector. The second is the sheer scale of the challenges and problems that Southeast Asia countries face in modernising their navies. Both of these make simple assessments difficult, as recent developments in Malaysia show.


The news that the Royal Malaysian Navy is about to deploy a converted merchant ship to act as a floating base in the Sulu sea to deter any recurrence of the Sabah incident of early 2014 shows that like all countries with finite naval budgets Malaysia has to choose between the threats it meets and to strike a sustainable balance between commitments and resources. This is far from easy for a country with such diversified maritime interests (not least because of Malaysia's maritime geography). It requires 'blue skies thinking' of the sort already demonstrated by its successful use of other converted merchant ships in the international anti-piracy campaign off Somalia. Developing this takes time and requires background investment, not just in ships and missiles, but in professional personnel development, education, business procedures and the like - which all cost money.

But it doesn't avoid the need for choice. If Malaysia is to take its proper place in the much-discussed 21st Century Maritime Silk Road, it needs to develop its maritime infrastructure so that merchant ships call, rather than pass by. China is one obvious source of

such investment capital but, some wonder at what price this might come. Malaysia's attitude to what it regards as Chinese 'intrusions' into the James shoal area of the South China Sea seems very relaxed compared to the equivalent responses of the Philippines and Vietnam and no doubt spring from a desire to keep relations with such a powerful neighbour on an even keel for strategic as well as economic reasons, but should Chinese policy become more assertive (as recent land-reclamation efforts make many suspect they will) this balance will become even more difficult to sustain.

All countries face such dilemmas of course, perhaps small and medium powers especially. One solution might be for them to band together in common cause as ASEAN clearly seeks to do. But the <u>delays experienced in getting suspected pirates back from Vietnam</u> demonstrate the inevitable problems in the clearly necessary collective approach to problems at sea and raise the question of how far it is wise for countries to assume foreign cooperation when developing their maritime policy.


