

#### New Chapter in Japan's Amphibious Capabilities

In April, the Japan Ground Self-Defense Force (JGSDF) activated the Amphibious Rapid Deployment Brigade (ARDB) that works under the direct command of the newly established Ground Component Command. For the Japan Self-Defense Force (JSDF), the ARDB is a critical piece in enhancing its amphibious capabilities to defend the nation's remote islands.

While amphibious capabilities are logical for an archipelagic nation such as Japan, such capabilities were long deeded as too offensive in the context of the "peace constitution." However, Japan began to take steps to establish amphibious capabilities from the 2000s amid China's growing assertiveness in the areas surrounding the Nansei Shoto. In 2002, JGSDF formed the Western Army Infantry Regiment (WAIR), and began to train with the US Marine Corps (USMC) to learn tactical practices, particularly through joint exercises such as "Iron Fist" that has been held annually since 2005. Further developments were seen with the issuance of the 2010 National Defense Program Guideline that further emphasized the critical role of the JGSDF's amphibious capabilities. Hence the ARDB is the culmination of the last 16 years of developing the JSDF's amphibious capabilities.

Currently, the 2100-strong ARDB based at Camp Ainoura has two Amphibious Rapid Deployment Regiments (with another to be formed next year), Combat Landing Battalion, Artillery Battalion, Reconnaissance Battalion, Engineer Battalion, Signal Company, Logistic Support Battalion, and an Amphibious Rapid Deployment Training Unit. The brigade has a high percentage of ranger-qualified troops. Moreover, the ARDB is under the leadership of Major General Aoki Shinichi who had tenures in the 1st Airborne Brigade and also in the elite Special Operations Group. Thus in structure and the staffing, the ARDB is on a solid start.

While the establishment of the ARDB is significant, there are several issues going forward.

First, there are questions over the "lift" capabilities. Regarding vessels, the Japan

Maritime Self-Defense Force (JMSDF) currently only has three Osumi-class landing ships, and even with the Hyuga and Izumo-class that boasts greater capacity and ability to accommodate some transport aircraft, there are questions over whether these are sufficient considering the ARDB's force structure. While some have discussed the need for acquiring amphibious assault ships, such acquisitions will take significant amount of time. Problems are also seen in the 17 MV-22B Osprey that the JGSDF plans to operate from Saga Airport, where controversies surrounding the tiltrotor aircraft has forced it to be temporarily based in Camp Kisarazu located 1200km away.

Second, given that amphibious capabilities are still new to the JSDF, time is still required to achieve optimal readiness. The foremost tasks for the ARDB would be to nurture fluency in their ability to defend the remote islands and to develop its own operational and tactical concepts and cultures. Achieving the above would not only require training, but also working closely with the USMC, and as well as learning from various amphibious operations to date.

Third, inter-branch coordination joint and integration is critical. While many refer to the ARDB as Japan's Marine Corps, there are misconceptions. The ARDB is part of the JGSDF, not the JMSDF, raising issues in the coordination between the two branches. Moreover, the JSDF must formulate new concept of operations to effectively and efficiently mobilize the ground, naval, and air capabilities in a coordinated and integrated manner. New efforts to establish a centralized, integrated command system is a step forward, but much time is required to fully mature the JSDF's joint readiness.

Naturally, much is in the works, and many more developments are expected in coming years. Despite its recent birth and many challenges that lay ahead, the establishment of the ARDB is undoubtedly another milestone in enhancing the JSDF's readiness to defend Japan's independence and sovereignty.
